

BILL 148 ADVOCACY

CHANGING FRAMEWORK


On June 1, 2017, the provincial government introduced legislation called the "Fair Workplaces, Better Jobs Act". The legislation was the result of a two-year examination called the "Changing Workplaces Review". The review was spear-headed by C. Michael Mitchell and John C. Murray and when completed offered 173 recommendations to government.

Proposed changes to the Employment Standards Act (ESA) and the Labour Relations Act (LRA) included:

- 1. Vacation Pay
- 2. Personal Emergency Leave
- 3. Equal Pay for Equal Work
- 4. Minimum three hours pay
- 5. Scheduling
- 6. Location requests
- 7. Refusal of shifts
- 8. New rules around union certification and bargaining

*It was also announced that minimum wage would increase to \$14/hr on January 1, 2018 and to \$15/hr on January 1, 2019. The issue of minimum wage was not part of the mandate for the Changing Workplaces Review.

The legislation passed third and final reading on Wednesday, November 22, 2017.





The business community was extremely concerned about the impact of the legislation as the changes were not only substantial, but great in number with a short implementation time.

ADVOCACY IN ACTION

- Letter to Minister Jeff Leal May 2017
- Small Business Roundtable June 2017
 - First roundtable in the province with Minister Responsible for Small Business Jeff Leal.
 - 24 business owners echoed their concerns that the legislation was asking for change that was too much; too fast.
- Standing Committee on Finance and Economic Affairs
 - Two rounds of public consultation. Submitted request to speak.
 - Submitted two reports to the Standing Committee:
 - July 2017
 - November 2017
 - Between the two reports 50 comments were presented from a variety of businesses in a variety of sectors.
- Online Survey September 2017
- Roundtable in Toronto with Minister Jeff Leal - October 2017
- Government Affairs Meeting October 2017
- Workshop at Business Summit November 2017
- Attended Roundtable with Minister Leal in Peterborough - December 2017

RECOMMENDATIONS

In both reports the following six recommendations were made to government:

- Phase-in the move to \$14.00 minimum wage over a five-year period
- Consider keeping the student minimum wage lower than the regular minimum wage
- Provide sector specific relief (tourism, agriculture, and weather dependent businesses) on scheduling and the 48-hour rule
- Complete an economic analysis on the desired changes related to Bill 148
- Reconsider the hiring of 175 inspectors
- Consider other ways, e.g. income tax measures, to improve outcomes for low wage earners
- Complete the pilot projects around Basic Income Guarantee and subject any recommendations being considered for implementation to an economic analysis

✓ The government has made these changes.

A policy resolution asking for mitigating measures around Bill 148 was submitted to the Ontario Chamber of Commerce for consideration at 2018 AGM in Hamilton.

WHAT'S NEXT


The Peterborough Chamber of Commerce will continue to update its members on its advocacy efforts and changes around the Bill 148 legislation.

PLANES, TRAINS, AND AUTOMOBILES

- Peterborough Chamber was part of a
 Peterborough Coalition that travelled to the
 South Simcoe Airport for the release of the report
 Flying Together: The Southern Ontario Airport
 Network.
- Another 9 kilometre section of the 407 opened -December 2017
 - Minister Jeff Leal recognized the advocacy work of the Peterborough Chamber
- VIA Rail Passenger Service Proposal & Peterborough Chamber of Commerce:
 - Led second letter of support campaign
 - Resulted in 30+ municipalities, chambers of commerce, boards of trade and community boards passing resolutions in favour of the project
 - Provincial/Federal Freight Analysis project announced in December 2017

BROADBAND

- Continued discussion at the Canadian Chamber of Commerce Annual General Meeting - September 2017
- Broadband infrastructure was part of the Peterborough Chamber's pre-budget letter to the Federal government ahead of the 2017 budget
- Approximately \$580 million was earmarked for broadband work in 2017

BUILT INFRASTRUCTURE

- Maintaining built infrastructure in our communities falls to municipalities
 - Peterborough County has identified the need for \$135 million over the next 10 years to maintain the current built infrastructure and the City of Peterborough sites an infrastructure need of \$1.194 billion
- Peterborough was also impacted by decisions outside of its control
 - Trans-Canada pipelines decided not to pursue the Energy East Pipeline Project.
 As a Chamber we were disappointed by this decision along with the delays and changes to regulatory requirements by the federal government.

#PROTECTGROWTH

SUMMER OF PROPOSED TAX CHANGES

In July, the Federal government announced it was changing how it would tax private corporations in Canada.

The tax rules that these businesses followed were established in the early 1970's. The proposed changes were not well received by the many small and family-owned businesses that were built and had grown under the current rules.

By the time the Canadian Chamber of Commerce Annual General Meeting in Fredericton, New Brunswick rolled around, many businesses and chambers of commerce were pushing back.

Finance Minister Bill Morneau spoke at that conference, but business leaders were not comforted by his response to their concerns about the proposed tax changes.

WHAT HAD BUSINESSES SO CONCERNED?

Changes to the rules around:

- employing and compensating family members
- selling the business to a family member
- reinvestment of passive income

Businesses were also worried that the changes were not receiving the proper public consultation with the process occurring over the summer months at a length of 75 days.

ADVOCACY IN ACTION

- Peterborough Chamber opens survey soliciting feedback from members -September 2017
- Delegates at Canadian Chamber of Commerce Annual General Meeting pass a resolution recommending that the government:
 - Rethink the changes
 - Engage in meaningful consultation with the business community around tax reform
 - Complete a comprehensive review of the tax system with an eye to fairness and simplification of the system for all taxpayers
- Delegates at the CCC AGM in Fredericton sign petitition card
- Peterborough Chamber members sign their own petition card at #LoveLocalExpo
- Peterborough Chamber uses survey responses and sends written submission to Finance Canada - September 2017
- Workshop on Federal Tax Changes at Business Summit - November 2017
- Response from Canadian business one of the most vocal in recent memory
